TENAFLY POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

The Tenafly Police Department recently conducted promotional processes for the ranks of Captain and Sergeant that were created as a result of recent retirements. The newly promoted officers are performing well in their new positions, bringing new energy, excitement and insight to their roles.

Captain Michael deMoncada is a 16 year veteran of the department. He was appointed in 1998 and served in the patrol division until he was assigned to the traffic division in 2002. In 2009, P.O. deMoncada was promoted to the rank of Sergeant and served as a first line supervisor in the patrol division. In 2011, Sgt. deMoncada was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and commanded a patrol squad in the patrol division. Some of his responsibilities and accomplishments include being assigned to the highly regarded Honor Guard, the highly trained Emergency Response Team as an entry person, a sniper, and currently as a team leader. He is the recipient of 2 Honorable Service awards, 1 Life Saving award and most notably, the Gallantry Star, for apprehending a fleeing homicide suspect from an Englewood home invasion robbery-homicide in 2002 that led to the conviction of all of the involved suspects. His new responsibilities as a Captain will include scheduling, training, internal affairs, grants, managing the police department accreditation process and a host of other administrative functions.



Sergeant Donato Monte was appointed to the department in 2006 and served in the patrol and traffic divisions. While in the traffic division, P.O. Monte performed traffic related functions that included policing school traffic, investigating motor vehicle crashes, investigating traffic complaints, applying traffic calming measures, and conducting enforcement details to name a few of his responsibilities. P.O. Monte is the department's bargaining unit treasurer, he is a member of the highly regarded Honor Guard, he's a certified crisis negotiator, and he's a new member to the Emergency Response Team. He is also the recipient of an Honorable Service and Life Saving award. His new role as a Sergeant will be to serve as a first line supervisor for a squad in the patrol division.

The purpose of the event is to have the community come out on a weekday night to meet the local emergency services personnel, to get to see some of the equipment we use (i.e. patrol cars, Emergency Response Team tools and gear, fire trucks, firefighting gear, ambulances and the gear they carry), and to receive preventative measure tips and instructions for some of the problems that can affect the residents such as burglaries, thefts, scams, false alarms, accidental fires, basic first aid tips, etc. The event will take place in front of the emergency services complex on Riveredge Road. The Tenaflly Recreation Department will be a participating borough department as well. We look forward to seeing you at this wonderful family-oriented event.

Crime Prevention: Home Burglary

Burglaries are on the rise again. Help us and yourself by making your home appear occupied when it's not. Below are some helpful tips to make your home less attractive to a potential burglar:

- Leave the T.V or radio on
- Leave a car in the driveway instead in the garage
- Use timers to turn on interior and exterior lights
- Never leave newspapers on the ground for long periods, or mail visible in your mailbox as well.
- Avoid leaving delivered packages on your stoop.
- Avoid having your dry cleaning left hanging on the front door.
- Get a heavy safe for your valuables and lag bolt it to the floor or wall.
- We're all creatures of habit. Don't store your valuables (jewelry, watches and cash) on or in your bedroom dressers or closets. Although it may be a slight inconvenience, storing your precious items elsewhere could be the difference if they're taken or not.

Car entries/burglaries are also on the rise. For the vast majority of these types of incidents, the vehicle is almost always unlocked. It's rare when a car is actually forcefully broken into. These incidents usually occur in the early morning hours when most people are asleep. The last thing the car burglar wants to do is set off a car alarm in the wee hours of the morning, which will occur if the vehicle is forcefully opened. So with that being said, the simple act of locking your car's doors will usually force the burglar to move on to a different location.

2013 PROPERTY TAX INFORMATION

2013 Tax Rate

As of the date of this newsletter, the 2013 certified tax rate had not been struck by the County. The 2012 tax rate was \$2.297 for every \$100.00 of assessed property value.



2013 Third Quarter Taxes

The 2013 final/2014 preliminary tax bill should be mailed sometime in July. We are waiting for the Bergen County Tax Board to strike the rates for each municipality in the County. If the tax bills are mailed out after July 18, 2013 a notice will be included with the bill explaining that no interest will be charged for 25 days from the date of mailing. If third quarter payments are made after that date, interest will be charged from August 1, 2013 to the date of payment.

Homestead Rebate

The Homestead Rebate program is administered by the State of New Jersey. Most eligible homeowners will receive their homestead benefit for 2011 in the form of a credit applied to their property tax bills in August 2013. Those homeowners can expect to receive a revised property tax bill or advice copy from their tax collector that will reflect the amount of the benefit. However, any homestead benefit for which you are eligible will be issued in the form of a check (or direct deposit) in August 2013, if (1) your principal residence was a unit in a co-op or continuing care retirement community or (2) you stated in your application that you no longer own the property that was your principal residence on October 1, 2011. You may call 1-888-238-1233 for more information.

Property Tax Reimbursement

The Property Tax Reimbursement (aka the Tax Freeze) program is administered by the State of New Jersey. The state announced on June 2, 2013 that the due date for 2012 applications has been extended to September 16, 2013. The 2011/2012 income limits for this program are \$80,000 and \$82,880, respectively. You may call 1-800-882-6597 for more information.

Tax Sale

The Tax Sale for unpaid 2012 taxes is scheduled for October 21, 2013. Any property that has unpaid 2012 municipal charges on August 30, 2013 will be included on the tax sale list as a permanent municipal record. The tax sale list for unpaid 2012 municipal charges will begin to be publicly advertised during the week of September 22, 2013, if 2012 charges are paid after September 13, 2013, it may not be possible to be removed from the advertisement.

2013 ROAD RESURFACING PROGRAM

DECREASE IN SOLID WASTE TONNAGE REVEALED BY STUDY

The Borough has conducted a ten year study from 2003 – 2012 on solid waste tonnage. Over this period, there has been a decrease of 2,200 tons, or 30%. In Tenaflly’s total volume. Several factors have contributed this decrease in tonnage. However, a major contributor is a reduction in recycling.

Unfortunately, not everyone in our community recycles. For those of you who do not recycle, please start. Recycling is the law, and it is required. Please call our office at 201-568-4134, and we will be glad to help. However, we need everyone’s cooperation. Tenaflly has achieved Bronze certification with the Sustainable Jersey Program. Recycling volume was one of the major actions that got us there. Tenaflly can do better!

TENAFLY'S HISTORY ON DISPLAY



The Historic Preservation Commission, in tandem with Borough Historian Alice Renner Rigney and her assistant, Paul Stefanowicz, have filled the two display cases in the Tenafly Library with artifacts of great local interest. The HPC's case reflects its mission of preserving the architectural and historic legacy of the borough, as directed by New Jersey's statutes and the local ordinance. Karen Neus, Mario Turchi, and Don Merino led the HPC's effort.

The HPC case contains the only known, original fleur-de-lis from the roof of the Railroad Station dating back to 1873. In the restoration of the station in 1994, it served as a model for the current ones there.

A print from the Walker's Atlas of Bergen County (1876) depicts the former Waddell mansion at the corner of Engle Street and Forest Road. Unprotected by ordinance, it has since been demolished and only the stone portals and retaining walls remain.

The case also includes survey and designation reports produced by the HPC to further the public's knowledge of historic properties and to aid the commission in making its landmark recommendations to the Mayor and Council. Additionally, the case includes a copy of Tenafly Design Guidelines for Landmarks and Historic Districts, published to give some guidance to historic homeowners in restoring and altering their homes.



Of keen interest is the new, oval plaque to be found on Tenafly houses which are landmarked or at least 100 years old. The plaque displayed in the exhibition belongs to the Lyman-Browning Estate Cottage at 170 Thatcher Road and states its approximate

year of construction, "Circa 1866." Those residents interested in purchasing a plaque may contact the HPC at tenaflyHPC@gmail.com.

The Borough Historian's display case features photos and plans from the restoration of the bandstand in Huyler Park in 2011, and items crafted for the fundraising effort to restore the Tenafly Railroad Station. Beer bottles and a jug from the Garsch bottling company convey the story of one of Tenafly historic businesses --items such as these have occasionally been found by Tenafly homeowners in attics and under porches. Also included are Rigney's paintings of "Cotswold", the historic Coppell manor on Byrne Lane which was long ago converted to apartments, and was the home of famed bandleader Glenn Miller, and of the Elizabeth Cady Stanton house.

Community Conversations: We're Listening

For over a year, TNC has been engaging with the community about our proposed new Education and Discovery Center. Positive feedback affirms our mission and confirms that our vision aligns with the community's need; dissenting voices challenge us to reconsider fundamental assumptions. Clarifying critical facts will aid this public discourse.

Wetlands Investigation: Every step of our investigation is publicly available.

TNC engaged a professional wetlands scientist to sample soil and vegetation to identify a dry site large enough for a new facility. To verify the wetlands buffers, Amy S. Greene, Environmental Consultants, prepared an application to NJ DEP, which was authorized by the Tenafly Council in March, 2012. NJ DEP's July 2012 Letter of Interpretation confirmed that our proposed site falls within permissible wetlands boundaries.


Redfield Building Site: We initially preferred to renovate or rebuild on Hudson where the Redfield Building currently sits. Architectural and engineering firms concluded that the aged building's infrastructure cannot support a significant expansion. Because of Hudson site's steep grade, (upper Hudson averages a 14% grade) current building codes prohibit construction on the same footprint.

Alternate Sites off Hudson or Route 9W: The deed to the 200 ft.-wide strip along Route 9W, donated to Tenafly by John Rockefeller, prohibits any building and limits road access. In addition, field investigation eliminated other possible sites along 9W and the upper Main Trail because of extensive hydric soil and wetlands vegetation.

Land Disturbance: TNC is committed to universal access for the new building which necessitates a maximum grade of 5% for parking and walkways. To welcome all visitors and allow seniors and others with disabilities to use a new facility it must be flat and dry. As the topography of the Clinton site is flat, far less environmental damage will be done to construct the new center there, than the work needed to meet current construction standards (5% grade) on the steep Hudson site. The distance through steep terrain to a natural plateau on the Hudson site is over 250 feet. While it may be possible to get variances to bulldoze and blast flat areas out of the natural slope on the Hudson site, such ecologically destructive and unsustainable development is contrary to TNC's mission (preserve, protect and minimally impact). Moreover, site work to make the Hudson site accessible would add significantly to the construction cost.

Visual impact: On the Clinton site, the new, single-story Center is set 600 ft. back from the road, along a ridge line. The proposed 1.7-acre site, off Clinton is less than one half of one percent of the preserve's area. Trees will screen the 7,950 sq. ft. building from the road, preserving the wooded approach to Tenafly. Building on Hudson would place the parking and building on the high point, compromising the tranquility of Pfister's Pond with lights, noise and parking. Locating a new Center off Clinton will actually preserve and enhance the serenity that residents currently enjoy on trails surrounding Pfister's Pond.

Community Conversations: We're Listening



Flooding: On the Clinton site, 85% of the site area and 100% of the building area runoff feeds into the Hudson River watershed, draining away from Tenafly residences. TNC proposes to reduce storm water runoff by approximately 40,000 cubic feet from runoff that now drains from the undeveloped site. In other words, flooding risk on Clinton during storm events would actually be lower than it is now. By contrast, the steep Hudson site is entirely in the Hackensack River watershed, making flooding abatement much more difficult.

Traffic: Access from E. Clinton, a major East-West artery, will accommodate TNC's typically off-peak traffic flow with little disturbance to residential neighborhoods. TNC Programs for school children begin after 9 am and end after lunch. Road improvements along E. Clinton will make conditions safer and easier for cars entering and leaving Kent and nearby roads. Increased traffic from a new, larger center on Hudson will adversely impact the avenue's residential neighborhood.

Transparency: Our proposal has been presented and discussed at dozens of meetings of Tenafly government bodies and other community groups. The local press has reported extensively and published multiple letters expressing different viewpoints. We posted the proposal on our website, and at the Library and the Municipal building, as soon as we had schematic plans--a full month before the April 23 public hearing. We sent a notice of the hearing to every registered voter's household. We continue to lead public tours of the site. The full four-hour public hearing can still be viewed on our website, where we will post every written comment received during the comment period and a detailed response to each written comment and every question raised at the hearing.

WHITE -TAILED DEER ALERT FROM THE TENAFLY POLICE DEPARTMENT

May and June is the white-tailed deer birthing season. Every year we receive reports of abandoned fawns that residents find in their yards. Often times, the fawn is not abandoned and the mother deer is just away feeding. If you find a fawn in your rear yard, don't touch it. Leave it where it is and monitor the location over a couple of days. In most cases the mother will return and tend to the fawn. If the fawn hasn't moved in that time and you haven't seen the mother, at that time we recommend calling the police department to assess the animal.

TENAFLY YOUTH CENTER: THE PLACE TO BE!

For the last twenty years plus, the Tenaflly Youth Center has continued to serve middle and high school-aged residents of Tenaflly as their “home away from home”. Although you do not have to be a member of the Youth Center to utilize the facility, we are proud to acknowledge that more than 1000 middle and high school students are registered members of the Youth Center. The Youth Services Director is also proud to announce that over 400 members are utilizing our facilities currently, providing us with a daily attendance average of 60 to 70 students, with Friday our most popular day at an average of over 120 students. Another big success for the Youth Center has been its Summer Camp for Teens.



In an effort to continuously attract and entice Tenaflly’s youth to make use of this special service, Director Mark Slawson and his staff have worked vigorously all year to upgrade services available at our facility located at the southern end of the Municipal Center.

Our members will be treated to fun activities and events in 2013, and this year we will be hosting our own Tenaflly Teen Idol Contest where twice a month young talent in Tenaflly will have the opportunity to perform for their peers as well as a panel of special guest judges. An old idea but with use of modern technology will be “Movie Night”. The movie of the week will be seen on two flat screen televisions on two different sides of the center. Now for you members who are saying there is too much change, we still have our old activities like billiards, ping-pong, foosball, and air hockey. We have upgraded our home video game systems with both X-Box 360 and PlayStation 3 and yes, we have the WiiU!

Not only do our participants have the opportunity to just “hang out” and have fun with their friends from school while at the Youth Center, they also have access to our state-of-the-art computer room where they can enjoy quiet time to complete their studies for school. We also welcome suggestions for other activities at the Youth Center.
