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THE 2011 MUNICIPAL BUDGET PASSES INTRODUCTION

The 2011 Municipal Budget in the total amount of \$26,298,481 was introduced by the Mayor and Council at a public meeting held on March 22, 2011. Prior to introduction, the governing body held a series of budget deliberation meetings on February 24, February 28, March 3, March 7, March 10, and March 15, 2011. All meetings were convened in the Richard D. Wilson Committee Room at Borough Hall, from 7:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. The sessions consisted of in-depth reviews of the budget recommendations prepared by the Borough Administrator and the Chief Financial Officer. Copies of the preliminary budget were available for public viewing at Borough Hall and the Tenafly Public Library.

This is the Borough's first operating budget prepared under the new "Property Tax Levy Cap" which places a 2% CAP on the allowable amount to be raised by taxation to support the municipal budget in 2011. Additionally, total budget appropriation increases may not exceed 3.5% in accordance with the appropriation CAP, which was already in place under New Jersey budget statutes. The 2011 operating budget was developed in compliance with these stringent limitations.

With respect to overall changes in the budget, the municipal tax levy for 2011 increased by only \$149,298 from \$21,374,225 in 2010 to \$21,523,523 in 2011 which equates to .7%. The tax levy increase is less than 1%. This is substantially lower than the maximum allowable levy of \$22,310,640 permitted by the state based on the new tax levy cap law. This modest increase is attributable to a decrease in revenue (\$189,650) partially offset by a decrease in appropriations (\$40,352).

Due to a borough-wide property revaluation, the average assessed valuation per home has increased to \$783,900 as compared to the 2010 average of \$635,200. Based on the new assessed valuation, the tax levy increase will result in a net decrease in the municipal tax rate from .694 to .561 (-19%) and a decrease of \$9 (-.2%) in taxes on the average home, based on the 2011 average assessed valuation.

The Budget Public Hearing and Final Adoption are scheduled for Tuesday, April 26, 2011, at 7:30 p.m. at Borough Hall. Additional budget information can be found on the Borough's website at <http://www.tenaflynj.org>.

Oh Deer . . .

The knock of a woodpecker, the rustling of a chipmunk searching for food . . . these are familiar sounds that most Tenafly residents enjoy. Tenafly was developed in a way that preserved many mature trees and natural woodsy areas. Visitors to places like Tenafly Nature Center are often excited to see and hear the robust populations of native species and appreciate the delicate natural balance between animal populations and the environment. Yet sometimes people would prefer if wildlife understood property lines and were more wary of human residences.

White-tailed deer are a native species found throughout the state. As NJ's deer population has grown, they have caused suburban residents both joy and frustration. It can be magical to see a buck with a full set of antlers, or a doe and newborn fawn at dusk in your back yard. In suburban yards all over the state, gardeners and landscapers must now take deer appetites into consideration when choosing outdoor plantings. Even "deer resistant" plantings will not protect home owners completely from these animals and the signs they leave on their property. So what can be done?

Fencing and repellents can address some of these problems, but economic, personal, and aesthetic considerations can restrict the use of these techniques. And, people need to understand that what is effective in one area may not work in another.

Installing a fence with a minimum 8-foot height around your entire property can prevent deer from entering. Lightweight fencing is available at many garden centers and feed stores. Additional barriers to supplement fencing, such as cattle guards across driveways, can help to keep deer out. Each homeowner will have to weigh the cost and effort required to install barriers against the effects and damage caused by deer.

Deer repellents (for example, coyote urine) applied to plants and property lines are another way to prevent deer from browsing. Keep in mind that effective repellent programs require frequent applications because of plant growth and weather dilution. People have found that repellents do not always perform well with large numbers of deer. While the repellent may protect one type of plant, the deer may turn to alternative plants for food. And, if food is scarce, the animals might ignore chemical repellents.

Although fencing and repellents may reduce deer impacts on a particular site, they do not address deer population numbers. By utilizing these techniques, you might be solving your problem, but the deer might move on to your neighbors' plantings. Any prevention techniques are best employed within the context of a comprehensive deer management program.





2011 Introduced Municipal Budget Summary—Continued from Page 1**REVENUES: Total revenue decreased by \$189,650 from 2010 or 3.8%**

- ◆ State aid anticipated is \$1,119,801; the same as 2010. State aid in 2010 was reduced by 21% from 2009.
- ◆ Surplus appropriated in the amount of \$1,500,000 decreased \$100,000 from 2010. The Borough surplus has been reduced from \$2.3 million in 2005 to approximately \$1.2 million as of December 31, 2010.



APPROPRIATIONS: Total appropriations decreased by \$40,352 from \$26,338,833 in 2010 to \$26,298,481, or .2%.**INCREASES**

- ◆ **Sewerage service** in Tenafly is part of the tax bill and not a separate assessment as in some communities. In 2011 the Bergen County Utilities Authority, which treats the sewage, has set the billing for the Borough at \$1,580,826—a budget increase of \$166,426 or 11.8% over the 2010 appropriation.
- ◆ The Borough is billed by the State for both **health insurance and pensions** based on eligible employees. The health benefit premium rate increased by 12% in 2011 but has increased by only \$25,000 (1.3%) in the budget due to staff attrition. The 2011 budget appropriation is offset by employee contributions anticipated for premiums in the amount of \$90,000. The pension contribution required for the police (PFRS) and public employees (PERS) retirement system increased by \$258,064 - a combined 17.3%.
- ◆ A number of pending **tax appeals** will most likely be adjudicated, or settled, in 2011. An increase in the reserve for tax appeals in the amount of \$50,000 has been budgeted to provide for funding of estimated appeals.
- ◆ **Fire hydrant service** charges assessed by United Water have increased by \$9,432 to \$241,982 or 4.1%.
- ◆ **Gasoline** has increased by \$50,500 to \$208,500 or 13% based on market trends and actual 2010 expenses.
- ◆ **Reserve for Uncollected Taxes** has increased \$68,839 due to a decrease in the borough collection rate used in the calculation formula.
- ◆ **Legal Fees** increased \$29,150 to reflect additional labor attorney fees that may be necessary for contract negotiations.

DECREASES

- ◆ **Salaries and wages** have decreased by \$380,531 due to staff attrition.
- ◆ **Other expenses** for Public Works and Police have decreased by \$140,931 including police vehicles, liability insurance, geese police, and other contractual items.
- ◆ The **Library** appropriation has decreased by \$24,280 due to a decrease in the realized valuation which is the basis for calculating the 1/3 of a mil.
- ◆ **Terminal leave reserve** has been reduced by \$40,000 due to the availability of sufficient funds required for anticipated retirements in 2011.
- ◆ Elimination of **emergency appropriations** in the amount of \$49,000 included in the 2010 budget as a deferred charge.
- ◆ Statutory charges including **Unemployment & Social Security** have decreased by \$63,750.

Tenaflly Kicks-off Environmental Resource Inventory Study

Representatives of the Tenaflly Environmental Commission and the Tenaflly Green Team held their project kick-off meeting with the planning consultant firm of Heyer, Gruel & Associates, of Red Bank, New Jersey. This meeting marked the commencement of the process to update the Borough's 2002 Environmental Resource Inventory (ERI). The groups were represented by their respective chair persons, Eileen Pleva and Bob Beutel. Jewel Thompson-Chin, Borough Administrator, also serves as a member of the ERI Project Team.

The Tenaflly Environmental Commission secured a Walmart Grant in the amount of \$10,000 through the Sustainable Jersey Program and the League of Municipalities Educational Foundation, Inc. to prepare an updated Environmental Resource Inventory for the Borough. A consultant search was conducted during December 2010 and January 2011, and proposals were received from five firms. After careful consideration of all applicants, the project team recommended hiring the planning firm of Heyer, Gruel & Associates to complete the ERI Report. The governing body authorized the contract at the February 15, 2011 Council meeting.

According to Eileen Pleva, Environmental Commission Chair, "Heyer Gruel has extensive experience working with municipalities throughout the State and in Bergen County specifically. We were extremely impressed by the proposal and a meeting with the consultant. We are very excited to enter into this endeavor with them."

The firm provided sample environmental resource inventories that they had prepared for other municipalities. These samples were prepared within a similar timeframe and budget. The sample reports were extremely impressive and detailed. The ERI is intended to serve as a detailed reference of local environmental information which all Tenaflly commissions, boards, and the governing body can use in their decision-making process about proposed development in the Borough.

It is important that the Borough has updated, clear and accessible information in order to manage their land capacity, conduct site plan reviews, develop municipal ordinances, prioritize open space preservation, and manage storm water issues. Tenaflly's street plan and overall development was initially largely determined by its hills, valleys and trees. On the top of the East Hill section, is over 400 acres of protected woodlands, which is home to red fox, white tailed deer, coyote, turtles, frogs, salamanders, and more than fifty kinds of birds.

Tenaflly's highly rated schools, close proximity to New York City, and the natural physical beauty of the Borough have contributed to an increase in population density and development. Large estates have been subdivided and the original homes were torn down and replaced with multiple larger homes. Smaller houses have been enlarged or replaced with larger structures, creating drainage problems as a consequence. Drainage and stormwater run off issues are particularly sensitive to the Borough, as Tenaflly is a part of the Tenakill Brook Watershed.

Topics to be covered within the Environmental Resource Inventory for Tenaflly include: Background and Introduction, Geography and Topography, Geology, Surface Water and Ground Water Hydrology, Soils, Biological Resources, Tidal and Non-tidal Wetlands, Land Use/Land Cover, Open Space Inventory, Climate, Air, Historic Resources, Infrastructure, Regional Relationships, Federal & State Known Contaminated Sites, Critical Environmental Areas, Findings and Conclusions, Recommendations.

In addition to the initial kick-off meeting, the Consultant will meet with the Environmental Commission, Borough officials, and Green Team volunteers during the study to review a draft report. The study will conclude with a public presentation to be announced at a future date. The team anticipates completing the project by October 2011.


